PBL LESSON: POLITE

RESPECT THE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT OF OTHERS

LEARNING INTENT:

• Students will recognise what a respectful learning environment is

SUCCESS CRITERIA:

• Students will CLASSIFY how a respectful learning environment looks, sounds and feels like by completing a Y chart.

VOCABULARY:

Respect

DISRUPTION

- What is disruption?
 - -Someone who is deliberatively doing a behaviour to gain the attention of fellow students and/ or the teacher

WHAT ARE SOME EXAMPLES?

- -Talking while someone else is or shouting out
- -Chatting, whispering, touching the person sitting near you
- Out of your seat without permission (even to go to the bin or get a resource)
- -Moving furniture (including changing a chair)
- Throwing objects
- -Using a resource (like an ipad) without permission
- Passing notes
- Yelling out to others
- -Making comments when the situation doesn't involve you
- Tapping pen, hand, feet, etc
- Refusing to remove your hat



WHAT CAN HAPPEN IF YOU DON'T RESPECT THE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT OF OTHERS?

- -You don't allow other students to learn an important content or a skill
- You don't learn the content or skill and you could fall behind.
 This is likely to result in poor results.
- -Time is wasted dealing with behaviour rather than curriculum

EVERYONE HAS THE RIGHT TO A QUALITY EDUCATION

- It is unacceptable to disrupt the learning of anyone else in your class
- The consequences of disruption are as follows:
 - -Imposition- you are moved away from friends to stop the disruption
 - -Detention- you make up the time you have lost, and if you don't attend this, you are referred to TAPPP room
 - -Buddy Class- you are removed to stop the disruption
 - Your parents are informed so they know why your academic results might start to suffer

IT CAN OCCUR IN THE PLAYGROUND TOO!


- Purposely gaining the attention of other students in order to create disruption in the playground
- Yelling, threating or bullying other students
- Talking someone else's regular seating area
- Trying to leave the grounds without signing out/ permission
- Walking around in large groups
- Not sitting in the designated areas
- Disrupting the game (handball/ basketball/ touch football) of others
- Unnecessarily yelling out when there is no immediate danger
- Running on grounds (excluding the designated play areas like the oval)
- Not entering the tuckshop appropriately or pushing in line
- Distracting the attention of teachers on duty

POSITIVE REWARDS FOR RESPECTING THE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT OF OTHERS

- Vivos
- Student/Class of the Week
- Ripple Effect- If you are seen following the PBL focus for the fortnight, you could be nominated for the ripple effect award. This is presented by the SRC and students are nominated by peers. It is different to Student of the Week
- End of Year Rewards- If you have been consistently following the 3Ps throughout the year, you may be eligible for an End of Year reward. For years 7-9 this could look like going to the pool or the movies. For 10-11 it will be a pizza reward.
